

Prop 1 Grant Funding continues

- Future OWOW grant applications
 - 2018-19
 - 1st Round Implementation Projects
 - \$23 million
 - 2020-21
 - 2nd Round Implementation projects
 \$23 million
- Disadvantaged Communities projects
 - \$6.3 million split between these two rounds



Prop 1 Implementation Eligible Projects


Non-State cost share not less than 50% of total project cost

 May be waived for certain projects benefiting Disadvantaged Communities and Economically Distressed Areas



Prop 1 Requirements (Cont.)

- Projects must be included in IRWM Plan (OWOW Plan) and:
 - Respond to climate change and
 - Contribute to regional water security (water supply reliability)



- Projects will address the most critical statewide needs and priorities for public funding
- Priority will be given to projects that leverage non-State funding or produce greatest public benefit
- Special consideration for projects that:
 - Achieve multiple benefits
 - Employ new or innovative technology or practices

DWR Principles for Change in Process

- Improve engagement between DWR and the IRWM regions to discuss how proposed projects will help the region and the Funding Area manage water more sustainably
- Give DWR an opportunity to seek clarification on projects in an application
- Give DWR the ability to only fund projects in a proposal that address the most critical needs within a Funding Area
- Maintain competition in the process
- Ensure projects developed through DCI Program have greatest chance to receive Implementation Grant Funding



SAWPA Comments to DWR

- Concern with DWR bypassing and not acknowledging local IRWM governance and plan (*Top down approach*)
- Two-step grant process creates additional grant preparation costs and delays
- The OWOW Plan defines our Funding Area needs
- DWR outreach and coordination with local IRWM is encouraged
- Support for innovative "integrated" pilot projects is encouraged



Comments Received by DWR

- Total of 13 comments letters, representing 14 IRWM regions
- Reviewed all comments within each letter and compiled by category
- Summarized major points on following slides

Prop 1 Priorities

Priority will be given to projects that leverage non- State funding or produce greatest public benefit

- Special consideration for projects that:
 - Cover a greater portion of the watershed
 - Achieve multiple benefits and
 - Employ new or innovative technology or practices



Additional Proposed Project Eligibility Requirements

All projects must:

 Contribute to the regional water resources need as defined in the IRWM Plan



- Provide a lifecycle benefit for 15 years as required by Government Code 16727 for construction projects
- Project benefit must be justifiable in terms of cost
- Demonstrate a funding source for O&M for construction projects
- Have CEQA completed and permits acquired before agreement execution

Proposed Revised Process

- Step 1 Applicant presentation/ consultation
- Step 2 DWR response
- Step 3 IRWM Region submits application
- Step 4 DWR Evaluates and makes Draft Funding Recommendation

Step 1– Applicant Presentation/Consultation

Applicant presents:

- Region description and critical needs
- Potential projects that could address those needs and demonstrates how they are eligible
- How past IRWM funding has contributed to addressing the needs and how the proposed projects build on past projects
- Nature of stakeholder coordination
- Critical Need Examples
 - Water Supply, Water Quality, Flood Management, etc.

Step 2– DWR Response
DWR reviews potential projects
Does not score, but provides applicant with a list of observations and comments

Step 3 – Application

Applicant may drop/replace/adjust projects based on DWR's review

IRWM Region submits application

Step 4– Application Evaluation

 DWR evaluation produces project specific and overall proposal scores
 DWR makes Draft Funding Recommendation

 Similar to existing process, DWR will not drop individual eligible projects from a proposal

Roundtable of Regions Workshop Comments – 9/21/17 Eliminate scoring for Funding Areas with just one IRWM and Funding Areas with funding agreements (no competition) - DWR staff was receptive Flexibility on use of disadvantaged community implementation grants after DCI Program is complete DWR staff was receptive and supported allowing IRWM to shift more funds to Round 2 to allow disadvantaged community involvement to complete

Roundtable of Regions Workshop Comments – 9/21/17 Conceptual Draft Grant Application PSP (Project Solicitation Package) will be shared with Roundtable of Regions before official release of draft PSP IRWM Plan Updates may not be complete in time

 DWR staff will prepare FAQs and accept as long as Climate Change Adaptation and WQ Constituents planning per Legislation are addressed

Goals & Objectives Purpose

- By implementing the OWOW Plan, what will we achieve?
- Where are we going together?
 - Goals are our destination
 - Plan shows where we are
 - Plan recommends how to go from where we are, to where we are going.







Steering Committee Input

- From the workshop,
 - Goals were consolidated
 - Effective collaboration, watershed management elevated to visionary statement
 - Goal statements made active, and parallel construction
 - Goals were not prioritized to reflect portfolio approach (Correction to page 17 footnote – not "co-equal" goals rather "non- ranked" goals without specific prioritization)
 - Future prioritization of *projects* will occur based on grant funding requirements and project selection criteria





The six goals of the OWOW Plan Update 2018 are to...

- Achieve resilient water resources through innovation and optimization.
- Educate and build trust between people and organizations.
- Engage with members of disadvantaged communities to help eliminate environmental injustices.
- Ensure high quality water for all people and the environment.
- Improve data integration, tracking and reporting to strengthen decision-making.
- Preserve and enhance ecosystems for open space, habitat, and natural hydrologic function.



Using the Goals & Objectives

- Pillars now will use the G&O version 4 draft to build their recommendations
 - Recommended management strategies
 - Projects, programs
 - Recommended policy strategies
 - Policies, practices






In Summary – Goals &Objectives now set for use

- As version 4 draft
 - We know they aren't perfect, yet.
- For use during OWOW Plan Update 2018 writing
 - Important for Pillars to have a stationary target.
- Next summer, when entire draft plan opens for public comment, further tweaks may occur.

Homelessness Symposium #1

- Conducted in June, 2017
- Started multiple paths of follow-

up

- Representatives from several cities interested in further discussions
- Discussions about the nexus of water management and homelessness
- Non-profit partners developing new programs
- Interest among participants to consider next steps

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Homelessness Symposium #1

- Generally, the first symposium had experts in homelessness in the panels, and water managers in the audience.
- Started new conversations, initiated new relationships.
- Since June, homelessness issue has continued to grow as a public policy concern in the watershed.







Homelessness Symposium #1

- SAWPA seeks now to program a second symposium
 - Before Thanksgiving
 - In partnership with an Orange County city, likely Anaheim
 - Panels to discuss how water managers can best support efforts to alleviate homelessness



DCI Program Support

- Homelessness Symposium funded by the DCI Program Grant.
- Budgeted \$20,000, spent about \$14,000 for 1st symposium
 - \$6,000 remainder will be matched by \$6,000 as requested in this memo.
 - \$12,000 total budget projected for 2nd Symposium
- DCI Program designed with 'reserve' Project Development funds, to be apportioned to needs uncovered during work.
- OWOW governance can programmatically direct allocation of those funds



Summary & Recommendation

 It is recommended that the OWOW Steering Committee recommend to SAWPA Commission approval of allocating \$6,000 from within the Project Development funding of the Disadvantaged Community Involvement Program to support a second Homelessness Symposium.

OWOW Plan – Project List

- There are two reasons for a project to be on the OWOW project list:
 - Proponents wish to have the project within the IRWM Plan.
 - requirements for other non-IRWM funding
 - or as part of a compliance pathway.
 - Proponents want their project to be considered for the next round of IRWM implementation funding.

Two-step Process

Step 1 – For Plan projects

- Projects can be submitted to be included in the OWOW Plan using "Call For Projects" and SAWPA online data entry form
 - Level of information: moderate (less than last time)
- Step 2 For Grant projects
- Project proponents, once in the Plan, can later request to be considered for Prop 1 Implementation Grant.
 - Level of information: extensive (per DWR requirements)



Two-step process

Step 2 – For Grant projects (cont.)

- Prioritize and select projects based on
 - 1) Eligibility and 2) DWR Grant Proposal
 - Solicitation Package
 - Early Prop 1 Eligibility Requirements shared back in July 2016
 - Projects competing for grant money will be prioritized and ranked by:

recommendations of OWOW Pillars
 approved by the OWOW Governance
 describing our critical needs at the time of the application



OWOW Plan – Project List

Each project proponent will be asked to describe all relevant benefits that will accrue from the project.

By classifying each project with all its benefits, it will be easier to see the extent of benefits



Discussion

1. Is a two-step project submittal process to SAWPA supported?

- First step will consider proposed projects that help attain the goals and objectives of OWOW Plan Update 2018
- Second step is more intensive, but only required for those seeking grant funds.

Discussion

2. Is the Steering Committee comfortable with the benefit classes being weighted as part of the Project Selection Criteria?

- Allows our region to decide some of the benefits achieved by projects are more sought-after than others
- Can be customized for each funding call, based on current most-needed projects and programs.
- Supports DWR request for critical needs



Often IRWM Plans, OWOW included, allow any proposed project to be included on the project list, regardless of the details of the project.

3. Does the Steering Committee agree that any submitted project should be included in OWOW Plan Update 2018?

 Or, should there be a minimum level of benefit or detail that a project must provide?

Summary of Next Steps

- 1. Conduct Call for Projects in early 2018 to be included in OWOW Plan Update 2018
 - Request projects to describe their contribution to the Goals and Objectives
- 2. Review preliminary Project Selection Criteria for Prop 1.

Summary of Next Steps

- Review Santa Ana River Watershed's critical needs, and the types of projects that may be eligible for Prop 1 IRWM 1st Round
- Finalize Project Selection Criteria and request project proponents who wish to compete for Prop 1 Round 1 to supply necessary information
