
Technical Assistance Criteria

- 3. Include a project sponsor that demonstrates engagement and readiness to receive the support and assistance
- 4. Meet at least one of the objectives outlined in Section 3 of the 2018 OWOW Plan Update
 - https://www.sawpa.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/02/OWOW-Plan-Update-2018-1.pdf#page=85
- 5. Provide detailed project information
 - Project location, schedule, scope, list of deliverables, grant amount requested
- 6. Achieve measurable improvements in the technical, managerial, or financial capacity of the project sponsor



Disadvantaged Communities Involvement (DCI) Program

- Prop 1 DCI Program purpose is to ensure the involvement of disadvantaged communities, economically distressed areas (EDAs), and underrepresented communities in the Integrated Regional Water Management Planning Process (OWOW)
 - Disadvantaged Communities defined at median household income less than 80% of the statewide Median Household Income (MHI)
 - Native American Indian Tribes are considered underrepresented communities regardless of economic status by DWR






DCI Program Technical Assistance Project

- Soboba Band of Luiseno Indians Residential Asbestos Cement Pipe Abandonment and Replacement Project
- Current water system asbestos cement (AC) pipelines was installed in the mid 1900's and have reached and exceeded their life cycle
- This project mitigates the potential health risks associated with AC water distribution systems if mainline breaks occur
 - Repairing (cutting) AC pipe may aerosol Asbestos containing material



Residential Asbestos Cement Pipe Abandonment and Replacement Project

- Project will include planning, outreach, environmental compliance, pre-construction engineering plans/design activities
- Funding will support the proposed project to abandon and replace approximately 15,000 linear feet of existing AC pipes in the domestic water distribution system
- Project schedule: 9 12 months





Residential Asbestos Cement Pipe Abandonment and Replacement Project

- ► This project has been reviewed and approved by the DCI Program Technical Advisory Committee
- Meets all the DCI Program Technical Assistance Criteria
- Project requests \$350,000 to complete outlined work from the DCI Program Technical Assistance Funding
 - ▶ Outreach component: \$50,000
 - ▶ Planning, pre-construction engineering, environmental: \$300,000
- Project leverages DCI Program grant funds for possible future construction and implementation activities under Prop 1 Round 2







SAWPA Project Portfolio – Prop 1 IRWM Round 1

- SAWPA Commission approved Cooperative Agreement to allocate Prop 1 IRWM funding to North OC on May 21, 2019
- Agreement has been approved by OCSD and OCWD Boards and pending OC Board of Supervisors approval in August 2019.
- North OC will withdraw DWR application as separate IRWM region upon agreement execution
- SAWPA approves suite of eight projects that includes upper watershed, watershed wide and DAC projects on June 4, 2019
- North OC Stakeholders commenced a Call for Projects in May 2019 and held rating and ranking project workshops in June 2019



Cooperative Agreement

- Projects in North and Central
 Orange County to be rated, ranked, and selected for funding by the processes in the OC Plan
- IRWM grant funds to be distributed as follows:
 - 60% upper watershed projects
 - 30% lower watershed projects (the OC Plan)
 - 10% regional projects



Orange County Project Selection Process

- 1st Call for Projects: January 4 –
 February 15, 2019
 - 8 projects submitted
- 2nd Call for Projects: May 3 May 22, 2019
 - 14 projects submitted



OC Project Ranking

Step	Scoring Component	Process
Step 1	Normalized Strategy Score	Sum strategy weights for all strategies addressed by the project and normalize
Step 2	Impact Weight	Select a weight that quantitatively/ qualitatively represents the relative impact of the project to the goal
Step 3	Goal Weight	Predetermined value that represents the importance of the goal within the OC plan
Step 4	Total Project Score	Repeat the process above for each of the 6 goals, and Project Administration, and sum




Raitt & Myrtle Park

- Provides water conservation education and on-site landscape assistance for residents and businesses in DAC communities
- Program includes direct community outreach including bilingual workshops, community events, site visits, and a telephone hotline

Recommendations
